PRINCE OF PEACE SCHOOL OPENING FOR 2021-2022

We extended the 2020-2021 school-year until mid-September in order to make up for lost time due to the pandemic. That meant that we could only provide three weeks of vacation before opening the 2021-2022 on October 4. Teachers and students alike were happy to get started up again.

Unlike many public schools where classes were delayed because teachers were striking to demand better facilities and much delayed salary increases, Prince of Peace got off the ground without any hassles. Faculty, students, and parents cooperated to assure a successful beginning; no one wanted to repeat the delays experienced last year. We have been fortunate in the recent past to see a decrease in the level of violence in the region and we need to take advantage of this lull to move forward with classes.

Here is a rundown of our numbers this year:

- > In kindergarten and pre-K: 153 students
- > In grades 1-6: 340 students
- > In grades 7-12: 190 students

The total number is: 683 students.

This number does not include the adults who use the classrooms in the afternoons to learn the basics they were never able to as children.

We would like to take advantage of this issue of the newsletter to reiterate, from the bottom of our hearts, our gratitude to all our benefactors who have shown great generosity in helping us build our facilities and furnishing them so well, all for the academic excellence of our students. Your support is invaluable. As you already know, an Assumptionist education aims to positively transform our students and the society in which they live. This is needed more than ever in the Congo, a country struggling to get out of a decade-old quagmire.
