Like Mary, we need to reflect on what we have learned from the birth of the Christ Child. Like the shepherds, we need to return to our lives giving praise to God for what we have heard and seen.

If this isn't normalcy for us, then it should be! We should be transformed by the fulfillment of the prophecy and inspired by the wonder of Christ's birth. We should be in awe that God has given us his Son to be our Redeemer. We should be humbled by Mary's "yes." We should be motivated by the urgency of the shepherds to share the good news with those around them. We should follow Joseph's example of patience and adherence to God's will.

There is so much depth and richness in those sentences from Luke's gospel. We have experienced something that is far from normal, and we have been given lessons that should

sustain us for the coming year. Like the shepherds, let us make haste to spread the good news.
