But he has no root and lasts only for a time. . .The seed sown among thorns is the one who hears the word, but then worldly anxiety and the lure of riches choke the word and it bears no fruit. But the seed sown on rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold." (Matthew 13: 20-23).

Let us use our time for reflection wisely---no matter where we are. We could be at a beautiful beach, a calm lake, a breath-taking mountain, in a church, or even in our own rooms. The place is inconsequential. What is essential is how we incorporate God's word into our daily lives; how we absorb His message; how we infuse His teachings into our relationships with others.

Be the one who has the rich soil and welcomes the seed, the Word of God.
