You have brought them abundant joy and great rejoicing. As they rejoice before you as at the harvest, as people make merry when dividing spoils. For a child is born to us, a son is given us; upon his shoulder dominion rests. They name him Wonder-Counselor, God-Hero, Father-Forever, Prince of Peace. His dominion is vast and forever peaceful, from David's throne, and over his kingdom, which he confirms and sustains by judgment and justice, both now and forever (Is 9:1-2, 5-6)."

Let us ponder these words as we await the arrival of our Prince of Peace. Let us use the symbol of the light as our guide during this blessed season. We need to follow the light to find the Light. Let us be reminded of the salvation we seek through the Christ Child. The Collect of the first Sunday of Advent reminds us of that: "Grant your faithful, we pray, almighty God, the resolve to run forth to meet your Christ with righteous deeds at his coming, so that, gathered at his right hand, they may be worthy to possess the heavenly kingdom."

Let us follow the light and run forth to meet Him.
